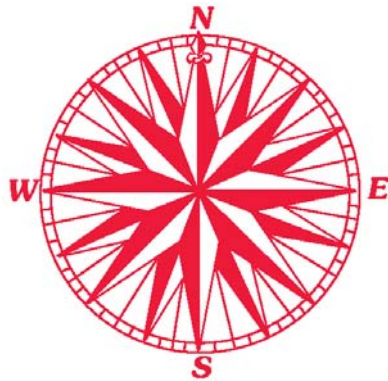

Emergency agencies closer to Salem 9-1-1 service

Lincoln County emergency services agencies will have to fund the Lincoln County Communications Agency (LinCom) at a reduced level for at least a year if 9-1-1 answering and dispatch services move to the Willamette Valley.

Lincoln County Counsel Wayne Belmont on Tuesday delivered that news and updated the governing body of LinCom on negotiations to contract with the Salem-based Willamette Valley Communications Center.

Concerned about the cost to replace aging communications equipment, the LinCom users board voted Dec. 21 to negotiate with WVCC for dispatch services.

The LinCom users board set July 1 for the switch to WVCC.

County officials have been meeting weekly with the WVCC to work out contract details.

Proponents contend that the larger WVCC has better equipment and more dispatchers on duty.

"This has been being talked about for three years," said Barbara Leff, LinCom Intergovernmental Council member and Depoe Bay City councilor. "We have to have confidence in the people working on this. We have to have confidence they wouldn't bring it to us if it wasn't in the best interest of the county."

Critics of contracting with WVCC say it means outsourcing 15 well-paying jobs to an agency without local knowledge needed to coordinate emergency response.

Roads Enders threatening legal action

Group of 25 property owners submit tort claim notice to city council

Property owners from Roads End continued their retort against what they view as "forced consents to annex" by submitting notices of intent to file claims for monetary damages and an injunction against Lincoln City during the city council's Jan. 23 regular session.

Brayden Criswell, vice president of the Roads End Water District (REWD), hand-delivered the tort claim notices from people "who decline to give into" what they deem as the city's "willful and wanton intent to

create a health hazard" in their unincorporated corner at the north end of Lincoln City. Criswell and Maud Krom, REWD's president, have consistently registered the district's official objections to all council actions surrounding a city resolution requiring that property owners in developed areas outside the city limits sign consents to annexation in exchange for continued city water service.

City staff began sending notices to Roads End property owners at the end of November 2011, giving them 60 days to sign the annexation consents or face the risk of having their access to city water shut off.

During their Jan. 23 session, council members unanimously approved an ordinance that revises utility billing procedures and outlines the process for declaring accounts "delinquent," which now includes any Roads End property owner who refuses to sign and return a

consent to annex within the 60-day time frame. It adds to the recent more hawkish approach than the city's lower key method established in 2004, under which the city required the consents to annex only when property ownership changed.

The changes and the mailings sparked the similarly hawkish response from Roads Enders.

Each identically worded tort claim notice states that a shutoff would "have significant detrimental impact on our rights as property owners" and would "seriously damage us and the property." Loss of water service, they note, would impact habitability, value and usability of property, could create serious health hazards, and would violate their legal rights to continued water service.

Yachats breaks ground on housing units

Townhouses will be geared toward moderate-income households

After almost three years of planning, zoning amendments and hearings, the nonprofit Our Coastal Village broke ground on the Aqua Vista Square townhouses in Yachats on Jan. 26.

Located on Aqua Vista Loop adjacent to Highway 101 in Yachats, the seven townhouses are designed to be affordable for low- and moderate-income households - those earning more than 50 percent but less than 100 percent of the area's median income.

"These are folks who make too much to live in the (low-income) Fistera Gardens apartments but not enough to buy a house in Yachats," said Layne Morrill, with Our Coastal Village.

Major contributions from The DLW Foundation and the James H. Woods Foundation allowed the \$950,000 project to move forward, Morrill said. No government funds are being used in the project.

The Yachats City Council agreed to spread payment of \$56,000 in system development charges out over five years.

"We've had many members of the community donate to help pay the SDC cost," Morrill said, adding that SDC donations are still being sought.

Local master gardeners volunteered to help with landscape design and installation.

"The ultimate goal is to sell them, but given the economy, it make take awhile, so we are actively pursuing rentals, as well," Morrill said.

The two- and three-bedroom townhouses will be between 800 to 1,200 square feet. The project sale price is \$169,000 to \$199,000, depending on size. Rental prices will be \$640 to \$850 a month, including all utilities except electricity. Aqua Vista renters and purchasers will be chosen by an application process.

With the Jan. 26 approval to submit a request for proposals for construction of the new Waldport High School, the Lincoln County School District is one step closer to opening the new campus in 2013. The board also heard no objections to using the contract manager/general contractor (CM/GC) model for this project.

The request for proposals was published in the Daily Journal of Commerce on Jan. 30, and according to Rich Belloni, support services director for the school district, construction companies were calling on Jan. 27 to find out if the RFP had gone out yet. The district requires that proposals from interested companies be returned by Friday, Feb. 17. Over the next two weeks, the members of the CM/GC committee will review proposals and interview applicants. Belloni said a notice of intent to award the contract is expected by March 7, and a recommendation may go to the school board by the March 13 meeting.

With board approval to solicit for CM/GC proposals, Belloni is putting into effect a "very aggressive construction schedule" for the 56,000-square-foot Waldport High School. The district will apply for a foundation permit by Feb. 14, a framing permit by March 15, and a final building permit by April 15. The construction cost is approximately \$11.1 million, not including fees for architectural and engineering services.

If all goes well, "we could have a contractor by April 1," Belloni said, with the start construction coming soon after. "It's a little ahead of schedule. If we get started in April, we could possibly be done in August 2013 to move in for September 2013."

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Steve Frey launches campaign for sheriff

With just over a month to go before the March 6 filing deadline for the May 6 primary election, a Lincoln County corrections deputy of almost 10 years has thrown his hat into the ring. Steve Frey filed his candidacy for the position of Lincoln County Sheriff on Jan. 30, saying that it was time to make that move. "I can feel it in my heart and soul," Frey said. "It's something I've wanted to do for years."

Frey moved to Lincoln County in 1989 while he served in the U.S. Coast Guard, and he raised a family here. He retired from the Coast Guard in 2001 after more than 20 years of service, including time at Station Depoe Bay and on the east coast. Of his time in the Coast Guard, Frey said he spent 16 years in a law enforcement role.

As a Lincoln County corrections deputy, Frey worked with the inmate work crews to beautify the Veterans of Foreign Wars Cemetery and said that during that project, as citizens saw the work of the crew, more began coming in and taking care of other individual plots - taking ownership of the cemetery. "Why can't that happen throughout the county?" he asked. "When you give people ownership, the sky's the limit."

Openness and compassion

are two key issues in Frey's campaign. "I'm not a closed door guy," he said. "We're all working to achieve a common goal - that goal is to make this place [Lincoln County] a great place to live."

Now, Frey works with the inmate work crews and often goes to local schools and the Angell Job Corps, bringing inmates to present what he calls "A Day in the Life" programs, to show students what it's like to be in the county jail.

Plans for the sheriff's office

"I want to liven people up, to rattle cages," Frey said. As sheriff, he would make his presence known and keep his office door open. "I would walk through the jail at least once a week to show people I'm there."

If he wins the election, Frey has big goals, including bringing parole and probation under the umbrella of the sheriff's office.

"We don't throw people in jail for a paycheck," he said. "We should try to keep the skids greased to help them go back to society."

A better approach than penalizing those on parole and probation so stringently would be to give them the rules and give them a shot to follow the rules, he said.

"Some of these guys go out on fishing boats, and if they're late reporting, the parole and probation officers are meeting them at the docks to take them to jail," Frey said. "How are they going to pay their fines if they can't hold a job?"

Another change that Frey would make concerns the decision to respond only to verified burglary alarms. "It'll create more work for the sheriff's office, sure, but if people see us doing our jobs and people take ownership of the community, it'll make the community better," he said. "There's no reason we can't be Mayberry."

"People look for respect, loyalty and high integrity in elected officials," added Frey. "They can look for that in me."

Transit system expands services

Schedule includes route to Albany Amtrak station

Starting Saturday, Lincoln County residents will have another option to travel from the Newport area to Albany as Lincoln County Transit officially begins the expanded Coast to Valley route that will run from Newport to Albany's Amtrak station.

The expanded route will stop in Toledo, Eddyville, Philomath and Corvallis, and it will run Friday through Monday and also on Wednesday.

The north county bus route will also start Sunday service, expanding its current schedule to seven days a week.

These service expansions are part of a Department of Energy grant that brings Lincoln County Transit into a five-county consortium - called the Northwest Oregon Transit Alliance (NWOTA) -

that will link transit districts in Benton, Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln and Tillamook counties.

"This new one-way trip (to the valley) means access and convenience for our riders," said Cynda Bruce, director of the Lincoln County Transit program. "Riders aren't going to have to stop at Ellmaker Park [to transfer buses] anymore."

The Coast to Valley Express will leave Newport City Hall at 8:45 a.m. and arrive in Albany at 11 a.m., then be back in Newport at 12:45 p.m. The second trip will leave Newport at 2 p.m., arrive in Albany at 4:10 p.m. and be back in Newport at 5:56 p.m.

Tickets for the one-way trip are \$10 each or six for \$50; youths under 12, seniors and disabled citizens can get single tickets for \$7 or six one-way tickets for \$36. Pricing for the six-ticket package represents a 16-percent discount from regular rates. Bruce said that these tickets are separate from the regular Lincoln County transit tickets for regular service.

To accommodate the expanded route, Lincoln County Transit has added a driver to its staff, with all of those costs paid by the Department of Energy grant.

According to Janet Wright, NWOTA project coordinator and Director of Columbia County's Transit Department, the grant will expire in August 2013. The five county transit departments are now working with a nonprofit foundation set up to seek funding opportunities to allow the consortium to continue after the grant has expired.

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Lincoln City takes back Habitat lot

Lincoln City Council members unanimously agreed to reverse a 2002 land transaction with Lincoln County Habitat for Humanity during the council's Jan. 23 regular session.

The city sold five lots on Spyglass Ridge to Habitat in November 2002 under the terms of a promissory note that sold the lots at appraised value, with no interest and repayable in 2027. Habitat developed four of the lots, but the remaining lot had "site development problems" - mainly drainage issues and a large ravine running through the property. Todd Pote, the city's engineering technician, said

required site improvements prior to construction would cost about \$30,000, which made the lot too expensive for Habitat's purposes to develop and maintain affordability for its clients.

City Manager David Hawker said Habitat officials had tried what they could and simply "don't want to pay taxes on it anymore." Because it's a no-interest loan, Hawker noted, the city is "not losing anything on it but taxes."

Habitat director Sally Bovett requested the reversal, which council members discussed during their only meeting in December. They delayed a decision pending further discussions with Habitat officials and Ron Tierney, the city's financial planner, hand-

ing the task to Gary Ellingson and Roger Sprague.

At the Jan. 23 meeting, Ellingson said those discussions led to the conclusion that "it would be very beneficial for us to take the property back at this time and leave it in the affordable housing inventory."

Other councilors agreed. They voted to reverse the transaction and place the lot into the city's land bank, holding the property for future development by the city or sale to someone else for development as an affordable housing project.

Judge rules in Seal Rock shooting range controversy

A Lincoln County Circuit Court judge ruled Friday that the county could require a Seal Rock property owner to have a conditional use permit to use his property as a shooting range.

Local residents and the county lined up against landowner Gerald Conrady in a long-running dispute over his alleged operation of a shooting range on the south end of Seal Rock.

Even as he prepared to rule, Judge Charles Littlehales acknowledged the case was far from over, saying ultimately the Oregon Supreme Court would decide the matter.

The case resulted in a flurry of lawsuits, with Conrady suing the county and several Seal Rock residents suing Conrady with the county joining them as co-plaintiffs.

The heart of the issue is whether Conrady and his friends are using the property for casual target shooting or whether he is running a shooting range.

At one time, he proposed using the 120 acres as the base for the Windy Gulch Training Fa-

cility for youth and posted on websites the availability of the shooting site. He says he no longer advertises, and the only people shooting are himself and friends.

State law allows landowners and their guests to shoot on private property and exempts them from local noise ordinances.

The county maintains that Conrady is running a public gun range, which requires a conditional use permit for his timber conservation-zoned property.

Seal Rock residents set up a website of their own to monitor shooting on the property and complained numerous times to the county and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

During Friday's hearing, Littlehales tossed one resident out of the courtroom for yelling "liar" at Conrady's attorney, Russell Baldwin.

Baldwin argued that since Conrady does not offer training courses or certification, he isn't running a gun range.

"The county is abusing its power," Baldwin said in court.

Assistant County Counsel Kristin Yuille represented the county at Friday's hearing. Yuille said afterward that the

county plans to take enforcement action if shooting continues on the Conrady property without a conditional use permit.

"He has explained that he is operating a shooting range, and he has advertised it," Yuille said. "He's saying, 'I'm not operating a shooting range, I'm going out and shooting cans, and that's different.' That's not what he is doing."

Yuille said the county would work with Conrady on obtaining a conditional use permit.

"I still believe I'm not running a gun range, and the county is trying to intimidate me," Conrady said of Littlehales' ruling.

Conrady vigorously disputed claims that shooting on his property posed a safety risk to nearby homes. A past president of the Oregon Shooting Range Association vouched for its safety, Conrady said.

"We've had local law enforcement from right here in Lincoln County out there shooting. If it was unsafe, they wouldn't have done that," Conrady said.

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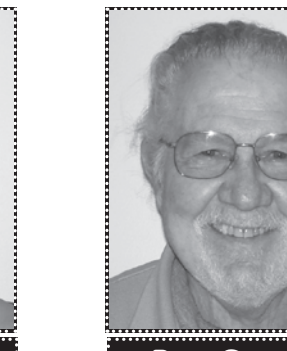

Our Coastal Village plans to price the units at no more than 30 percent of a household's income, whether buying or selling. The nonprofit is working to transfer ownership of the ground to the Lincoln County Land Trust and give the buyers title to the townhouse. Home-owners would be limited to selling the property at no more than 2-percent appreciation per year of ownership, and the Lincoln County Land Trust would have the option to purchase the property at that price.

"That provides the cap because they can't sell it to a third party for more than that, and the land trust can buy it from them at that price in order to maintain affordability," Morrill said.

Yachats City Councilor Sandy Dunn said employees in the town's tourism industry have a difficult time finding affordable

housing in Yachats. "It became obvious to me and others that we do have a void in the community, and we have a need in the community," Dunn said at the groundbreaking.

Construction on the first five Aqua Vista housing units is scheduled to begin this month and be complete by late August.

Our Coastal Village's primary emphasis is on affordable housing. It also helps fund the Yachats Youth and Family Activities Program pre-school, the Yachats Food Pantry, Seashore Family Literacy and other projects.

Repairs begin today (Friday), however, the water main will need to be flushed, chlorinated and tested before it can be returned to service. It is anticipated that the water main will be out of service for approximately one week.

City officials believe the South Beach water tank can provide adequate water supply for the area for a number of days. The city does not have the ability to refill this tank until the water main is restored to service.

The Newport Fire Department has been notified and they are making provisions for fire protection with limited water supplies.

The city is requesting that residents and business make every effort to conserve water and possibly delay any production or operations that may use large quantities of water until the water main can be brought back into service. Residents are also encouraged to have a 72-hour emergency kit at all times, including a supply of water in containers. Water is available at the city shops, located at 845 NE Third Street. Anyone obtaining water from the city shops must bring their own containers.

The district may have to include a 55,000-gallon water tank at the site to ensure that there is adequate water pressure to run the sprinkler system to comply with fire regulations, Belloni said. That does add about \$400,000 to the cost of the high school project, but in a \$15-million project, that extra cost "won't break the bank," he said.

Planning continues for Toledo school

In the same meeting, the school board held a hearing and

approved the use of the CM/GC model for the Toledo Junior/Senior High School expansion project, which will include two new classrooms, the gymnasium and the weight room.

Soil issues are forcing more preparatory work than anticipated, and the five portables at Toledo High are in use currently. Construction is expected to start this summer. Belloni expects to remove the portables at the end of the current school year and have students in the new classrooms by Jan. 1, 2013.

To accommodate students be-

tween September and January, Belloni said the commons area will be temporarily remodeled into two classrooms until the 9,040-square-foot classroom wing, entrance and improvements to the existing gymnasium are complete, which is expected at the beginning of the second semester. The preliminary construction cost is \$2.1 million.

JD Fruiten, owner of Pacific West Ambulance in Newport, said his company would not be using WVCC.

"From our perspective, if dispatch goes outside the county, we'll go our own way," he said. "We think those jobs should be created in Lincoln County."

In addition to cost savings and an equipment upgrade, supporters of moving to Salem point to the state's desire to consolidate public safety answering points (PSAPs). A recent Oregon Emergency Management Department report recommended consolidating the current 49 9-1-1 answering services to somewhere between one and nine regional PSAPs.

Oregon legislators may take up PSAP consolidation during the 2013 session.

Belmont said LinCom users are contractually obligated to financially support LinCom for a year, regardless of the dispatching agency they use.

"You don't avoid dissolution costs by going a different direction," Belmont told the IGC.

Taxing district discussed

Two past consultant studies recommended forming a countywide special taxing district to fund LinCom at a sustainable level. Such a district requires the approval of each city council and the Lincoln County Commissioners and a public vote.

Without a tax district, funding LinCom sufficiently to upgrade

equipment would require significant budget increases for user agencies in the coming years.

Phased transition?

Commissioner Lindly questioned whether July 1 is a realistic date to move 9-1-1 service to WVCC. He suggested the IGC consider LinCom contracting with WVCC for computer-aided dispatch consoles and record management, as Toledo does. Lindly said it could aid transition and possibly buy time to establish a taxing district to keep 9-1-1 answering and dispatching in the county.

Winding down LinCom

While LinCom dispatching services may move, the organization itself will need at least a year to disband.

For users, that means that in addition to paying WVCC, they'll also need to budget for financial support of LinCom.

Belmont said the chief financial liability facing LinCom is unemployment for the 13 employees. As part of the contract negotiations, the county is exploring job opportunities at WVCC for LinCom dispatchers.

County Commissioner Don Lindly stressed that a final decision won't be made until more financial information is available.

With a fresh, \$275,000 communications upgrade, the Toledo Police Department is exploring contracting for dispatch services with the Newport Police Department and the Siletz Fire Department.

Toledo, like Lincoln City, maintains its own PSAP but uses WVCC computer-aided dispatch and record management systems.

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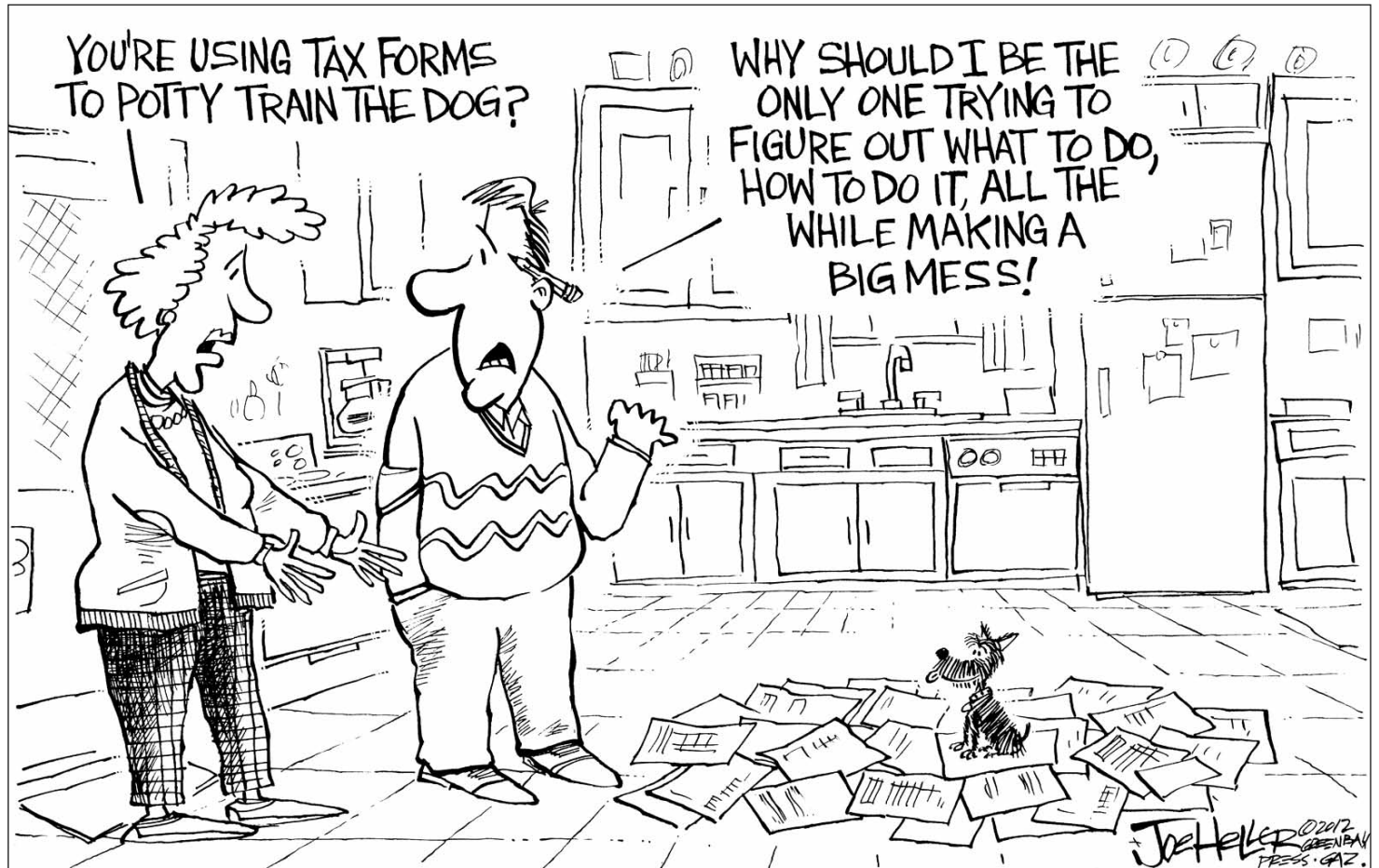

Symphony is making many new friends

The January Newport Symphony Orchestra concert began with as good a pre-concert talk as I have ever heard. Rising young composer Dan Kellogg shared the stage with Maestro Adam Flatt and Associate Conductor-Actor David Ogden Stiers to chat about the chal-

lenges of composition and performance of Pyramus and Thisbe, his musical portrait of rustic lovers in the play within the play A Midsummer's Night's Dream.

The prospect of watching David Ogden Stiers as both the lovelorn rustic swain Pyramus and his eagerly compliant nymph, Thisbe, was enough to pack the PAC. He did not disappoint. In addition to the young lovers, he portrayed the wall that separated them and the chink in it through which they frustrated, but ecstatic wooing had to be conducted, and he was also a roaring lion and the moon - a non-speaking part I seem to remember.

He made it all look easy, but how many actors can combine virtuoso sight-reading skills with the ability to adapt comic timing to the rhythms of orchestral music, and then create half a dozen different and distinct characters? Not many you must agree. I can think of two. Stiers is certainly one of them.

The orchestra, most ably led by Associate Concertmaster Kathy Follett, was in fine fettle throughout the evening. There is now more assertiveness in the percussion and increasing willingness to break through the acoustic fog that has swirled around the PAC for as long as I can remember. The brass was as the situation demanded, burnished but brazen, or fierce and in your face. The strings seem more unanimous at each outing. Nice idea, incidentally, for the concert master to stand and "hover" during romantic interludes in the Pyramus and Thisbe, like a fiddler in a Prague restaurant. I expected her to demand a tip.

The festive evening included Stiers on the podium for a spruce rendition of the Midsummer Night's Dream Overture, and after his sparkling conducting of the Kellogg, Flatt brought the evening to a close with a significantly joyful Beethoven 2nd.

I saw many new, and younger, faces in the packed audience and took this as a sign that the NSO, and Flatt's highly imaginative programming, was making a lot of new friends.

"Such actions are coercive and have caused us emotional distress and are attempts to intimidate us," the notices declare. "It is unacceptable to us that an agency of local government would choose to act in this manner by threatening to withhold a basic and necessary human and property service."

Of those 25 notices, 11 are from Lincoln City residents, 13 from Roads End property owners who live in Willamette Valley, and two are from out of state - one in California and one in Colorado.

City Manager David Hawker and others said they anticipate legal challenges whether they pursue the water shutoffs or simply move forward with the annexation process. The city ordinances, Hawker has noted in past discussions of the issue, are designed to provide a long-term mechanism to achieve "orderly" annexation.

The first ordinance required anyone wanting new development within the UGB to sign consents to annex to receive wa-

ter service. A second adopted in 2004 - and upheld in a 2008 court decision after a legal challenge - extended that requirement to cover new owners of already developed property within the UGB. The latest change requires the annexation consent from everyone outside the city in exchange for continued water service, and refusal to do so triggers a delinquency notice and potential service shutoff for continued failure to comply.

City Attorney Joan Kelsey said the just-adopted ordinance amendment clarifies the delinquency and shutoff procedure, but does not change the timeline - at least 50 days before city officials are authorized to shut off water - or "substantive due process." Anyone "can challenge the city's determination that an account is delinquent" through an appeals process.

The procedures also allow city officials to suspend the timeline for water shutoff, giving the city manager final say on whether or not to shut off to any customer. The driving force be-

hind obtaining consents to annex is the state law requiring city officials to get consents from a triple majority of property owners representing most of the acreage and property value in an area before they could annex it. And annexation itself requires an extended public hearing process.

Hawker said they intend to move forward with the shutoff process and procedures but could suspend them, depending on whether they reach a convincing enough triple majority to allow them to initiate annexation.

It all goes back to a 1978 water service agreement between the city and long-defunct original Roads End Water District. The agreement expired in 2003.

"Annexation was expected to occur before it expired," Hawker said.

Roads End property owners have always bristled at suggestions to annex, and - 34 years after the initial bargain was struck and almost a decade since it expired - their resolve remains.

Toledo accepting nonprofit applications

With \$7,000 budgeted for funding of nonprofit organizations that provide direct services to community members or in other ways enhance quality of life, the Toledo Contribution Committee is accepting applications for grant funding.

Interested organizations can

get an application from city hall or print one from the city's website. Forms are due at city hall by March 1. The contribution committee, which began under former mayor Sharon Branstiter, will meet in March to review applications before making a recommendation to

the city council. Funds will be distributed in July.

Funding comes from Toledo's portion of the state revenue sharing funds derived from cigarette tax and alcohol sales.

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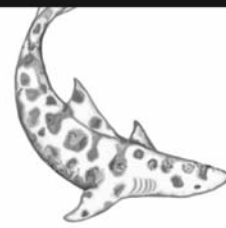

Portraying Abraham Lincoln

Steve Holgate brings impersonation of 16th president to Lincoln City

Less than one score years ago (12 to be exact), actor and historian Steve Holgate brought forth an idea conceived in the liberty of a return to acting and dedicated to the proposition of an equal and evenhanded portrayal of Abraham Lincoln.

Holgate will bring the nation's 16th president to life with his "Lincoln Town Hall" presentation scheduled for Friday, Feb. 10 at the Lincoln City Cultural Center. He starts with a 30-minute synopsis of Lincoln's presidency, featuring selections from Lincoln's most famous speeches, before opening the floor to questions from audience members, who become part of the performance in the guise of Civil War-era reporters.

Mike Burton, former chairman of the Oregon Lincoln Bicentennial Commission (created for the 2009 celebration of the 200th anniversary of Lincoln's birth), said Holgate "truly brings Lincoln to life." "His portrayal calls on all the wisdom, humor and lore of our 16th president as one would imagine him, and as Lincoln was in real life," Burton added.

George Vogt, former executive director of the Oregon Historical Society, said the actor, who has two score years of acting experience, "is the most convincing presidential impersonator I have ever seen. Not only does he look the part, but his historical knowledge and professional acting skills are first-rate."

David Leroy, former member of the Board of Governors for the National Lincoln Bicentennial Commission, called Holgate "the best Lincoln in America."

His resume as "Honest Abe" shows why. The congenial sixth-generation Oregonian has parlayed his remarkable

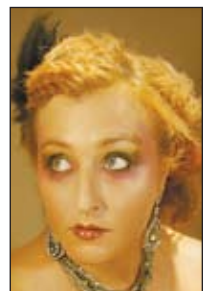
Izzy Cox performs in Lincoln City Feb. 6

Her unusual childhood took her from rural Texas to French-Canadian Montreal, where the formative years of her life were spent playing in the Salvation Army's marching band. At age 12, she was bit by the adventure bug; she lived and worked in horse racing tracks, traveled with circuses and took part in many early punk rock mosh pits.

At 16, she released her first two recordings while she was locked up in juvenile delinquent institutions, and she has never turned away from a life in entertainment. Until 27, she was involved in Montreal's progressive musical movement, releasing 10 records and playing four to six nights a week.

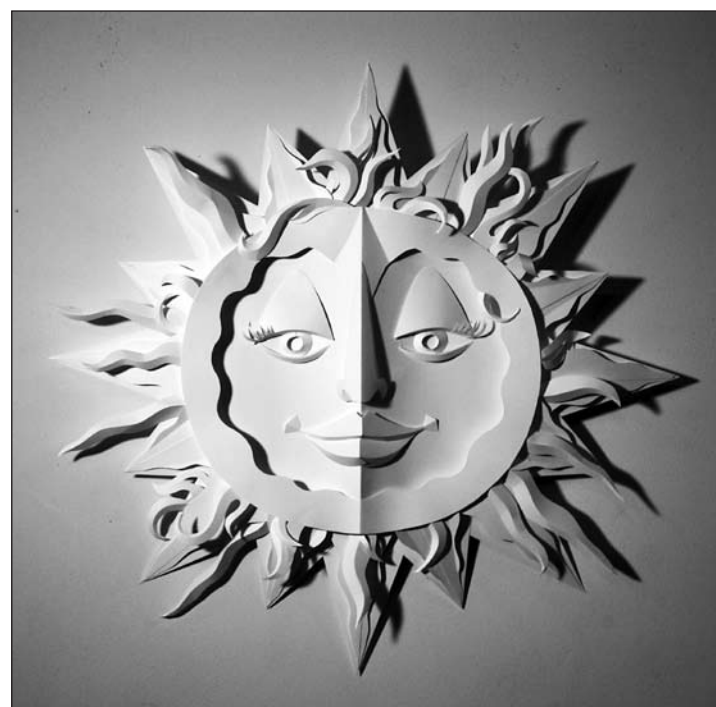

resemblance to Lincoln - enhanced by wardrobe, make-up and mannerisms gleaned through careful study - into crowd-pleasing live appearances throughout Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and elsewhere, including overseas. Holgate also appeared in "A House Divided," a television special aired on Oregon Public Broadcasting.

Physical traits that once worked against him as an actor - tall, lanky and thin-faced, with prominent nose and ears - perfectly fit his role as Lincoln.

"People always told me I looked like Lincoln," Holgate said in explaining his decision to create the role and write a compelling two-act, one-man play titled "A. Lincoln." It offers a more complete portrait of the 16th president, allowing Holgate to give audiences rare insights into Lincoln's life, among them his personal tragedies, favorite jokes and poetry. The play covers Lincoln's days as a young lawyer, his early forays into politics, his election as president and the nation's inevitable slide into the dark days of the Civil War, and the monumentally difficult decisions he faced as the nation's

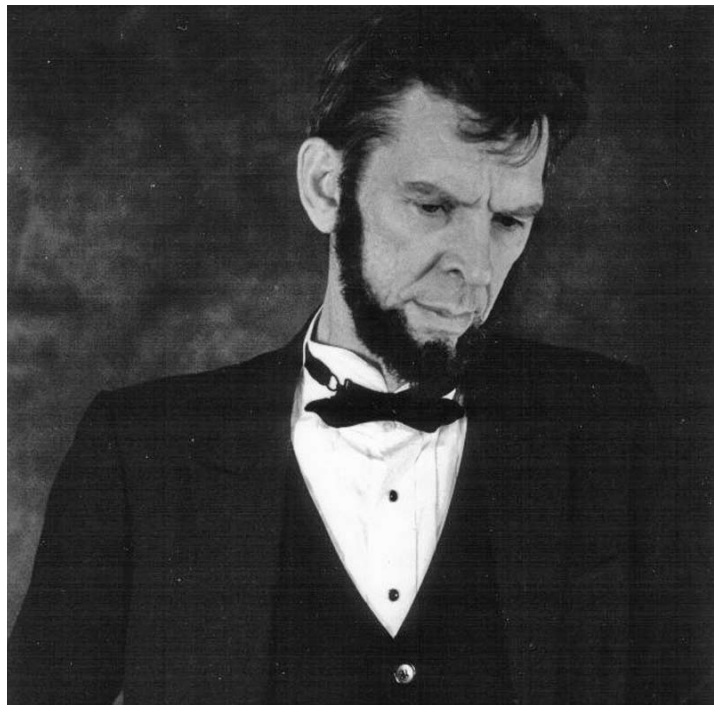
leader - and as an individual.

Lincoln himself was no less conflicted than the people enduring the most terrible war in their nation's history. While leading a fractured nation, his own household mirrored those fissures as the backwoods politician married to an aristocratic southerner and daughter of a slave owner from Kentucky. Knowing full well that "a house divided against itself cannot stand," Lincoln nevertheless harbored many doubts even as he steadfastly worked to ensure that "government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Holgate said folks are often surprised to learn about Lincoln's doubts, and although he leans toward realism in his portrayal, he holds back on some details to preserve the image of Lincoln most folks carry in their minds.

The town hall begins at 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 10 at the cultural center, located at 540 NE Hwy. 101 in Lincoln City. Cost for this performance is \$5 per person (free for children ages 11 and under).

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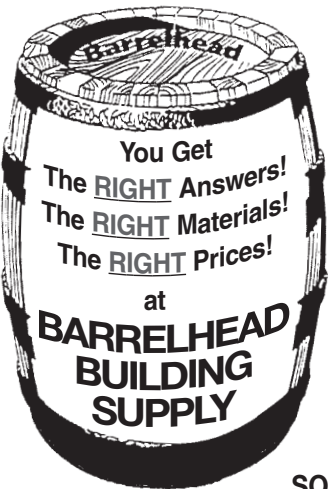

Enrollment open for aquarium youth training

The Oregon Coast Aquarium is looking for teenagers to join its youth volunteer team. Young people have an opportunity to explore the world of marine science and share their knowledge as aquarium interpreters.

Youth volunteers will spend 48 hours in training learning about marine science, marine animals, and conservation. Successful completion of training can earn young people three transferable college credits from the Oregon Coast Community College and high school credit in some high schools, as well.

"It is a great time to get involved and spend the summer with friends, learning and growing as leaders together," said Tricia Ratliff, aquarium youth programs coordinator. "There are so many opportu-

nities for students in the program; working with the public, volunteering with summer camps, working around marine animals and at social events. Becoming a youth volunteer offers an opportunity for teens to share their enthusiasm and knowledge with others."

Ratliff said friendships, personal development, and networking opportunities are also benefits of the program as volunteers find themselves working alongside aquarium staff and adult volunteers. "Some volunteers go on to pursue a career in marine sciences based on their experience as a youth volunteer," she said.

Youth volunteers are enthusiastic about the experience as well.

"I have learned so much about the environment as a

youth volunteer, and thanks to the aquarium, I was able to spread my knowledge to the community," said Emily Branigan, former youth volunteer. "It is so rewarding to have an impact on a child's life, whether it is encouraging them to recycle or showing them about the wonders of the ocean."

Volunteer training offers an introduction to marine biology, animal husbandry and the inner workings of the aquarium. Participants also study the aquarium's marine animal collection, as well as the Oregon coast's natural history. After completing the training, youth volunteers work with the public as interpreters. Volunteers work two 4.5-hour shifts each week during the summer, sharing their knowledge with aquarium guests. Benefits include educational

work experience, references and discounts in the aquarium gift shop and café, along with complimentary passes for every 100 hours of volunteer service. After completing 50 hours of service, youth volunteers are eligible to receive an aquarium membership.

Textile design is topic at museum

Award-winning textile designer Susan Webb-Rebecchi will give a presentation on the history and process of textile design at 1 p.m., Saturday, Feb. 11, at the North Lincoln County Historical Museum in Lincoln City.

Tax credits available for families

"As working families in Oregon start to prepare their tax returns this year, they need to know they may be eligible for federal and state tax credits worth thousands of dollars," said Nina Roll, director of Family Care Connection's Child Care Resource & Referral program at Oregon State University Extension Service. "Families are facing incredible economic pressures and can't afford to leave this money on the table."

Federal and state tax credits can help offset the cost of child care and other expenses for working families. Families may be eligible for a number of federal tax credits, including:

- Earned Income Tax Credit, which helps provide a wage supplement for low and moderate-income families (those earning less than \$49,078 annually). This credit is worth up to \$5,751, and is refundable.

- Child Tax Credit, designed to help families offset some of the costs of raising children. This credit is worth up to \$1,000 per child. Families who owe little or no income tax can receive some or all of this credit as a refund if they earned at least \$3,000 in 2011.

- Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, designed to offset some of the child or dependent care costs that families incur in order to work. This credit is worth up to \$2,100, though the amount that can be claimed is limited by a family's federal income tax liability.

In addition, Oregon also offers:

- Oregon Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, worth up to \$1,800;

- Oregon Working Family Child Care Tax Credit, a refundable credit worth up to 40 percent of qualifying child care expenses; and

- Oregon Earned Income Tax Credit, also refundable and worth up to \$345.

"These credits can help families in Oregon make ends meet, but they must file a tax return to claim the credits," Roll said. "Our goal is to help more families learn about the benefits of these tax credits, so they don't miss out."

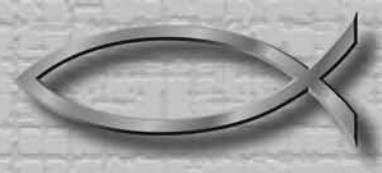

City and county proclaim 'No Name-Calling Week'

Lincoln County's Board of Commissioners and Newport Mayor Mark McConnell proclaimed Jan. 23-27 as "No Name-Calling Week." Sponsored by PFLAG (Parents, Family & Friends of Lesbians & Gays), this annual event is aimed at ending name-calling of all kinds and providing schools with the tools and inspiration to launch an on-going dialogue about ways to eliminate bullying in their communities.

Newport High has scheduled No Name Calling week for Feb. 6-10.

In the proclamations of No Name-Calling Week, it was noted that students who are bullied for any reason often experience both physical and mental health problems. Commissioners and city council members were informed about the increased risk faced by LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender) students by Jeanne St. John, chair of PFLAG Oregon Central Coast.

According to Jordan Ostrum, president of Newport High's GSA (Gay/Straight Alliance), research shows that "LGBT students are more apt to skip school due to fear, threats, and vandalism, and they often have little support at school, at home, and in the community. Twenty-eight percent of gay students will drop out of school, more than three times the national average."

St. John reported, "Students who have been harassed or attacked at school because of their gender or race are more than twice as likely to report having attempted suicide, while students who were perceived as being gay are more than three times as likely to attempt suicide. PFLAG is working hard to provide support, education and advocacy to keep kids alive and well."

"The good news is that stu-

dents from schools with an inclusive anti-bullying policy report that there is often less harassment because of sexual orientation or gender expression and that all students are more likely to feel very safe at school," she added.

The Oregon Central Coast chapter of PFLAG is working with the county's five GSA clubs to promote positive interactions and to reduce bullying and harassment for any reason.

The clubs have planned activities, contests, and educational opportunities related to No Name-Calling Week. PFLAG also supports LCSD in implementing its new and inclusive Anti-Bullying Policy.

Community meetings are being planned to raise awareness about the issue of bullying in Lincoln County schools and other settings. For more information, call St. John at 541-265-7194.

Tiger turnovers gave Newport the big edge, allowing Kacie Hargett to lead the scoring for Newport with 15 points.

"We have a tendency to telegraph where our passes are heading," rued Taft coach Daniel Mock, "and the defenses are picking us off and turning them into easy fast-break baskets."

Mock said the squad will be sweating during practice to come off the screens faster.

"Remove the points we give up from turnovers, and we would have been right in this game at the half," he said.

Newport swimmers shave times as district finals near

With many of her top swimmers sidelined by illness, Newport coach Angie Sremba figured Tuesday's meet at Taft would serve mainly as a tepid warm-up for next week's district finals.

But the results were better than expected, with strong performances led by the boys' sophomore class where Clay Smith clocked 1:12.18 in the 100-meter butterfly. Other sophomore standouts included Tanner Schipper, who posted times of 2:22.36 in the 200-meter freestyle and 5:16.48 in the 400-meter race.

The times may have been brightened by Taft's short-course meters, but the improvements were obvious. Sremba hailed Smith's butterfly as "a phenomenal swim" and predicted big things for the rapidly improving swimmer at district finals, slated to start Feb. 10. Schipper, whose strong effort garnered second-place finishes in both his events, continued to shave seconds off his best times.

But it was sophomore Austin Turner who dominated his races, winning both the 50-meter free at 25.08 and 100-meter back with a 1:04.16 time.

Senior Thomas Cramer also lowered his times in the 200-meter individual medley (3:05.72) and 400-meter

freestyle (5:42.07), while freshman Austin Thompson gave a glimpse of his future potential when he finished second in the 200-meter individual with a commendable 2:47.57. Another swimmer with the mettle to emerge in district contention is junior Connor Price, whose 100-meter time in the freestyle earned second place at 1:10.95. He also clocked 1:28.62 in the 100-meter breast stroke to take the silver there, as well.

Girl swimmers had their day, as well, with junior Alyssa Taylor taking the gold in the 50 with a blistering 31.73 time, then repeating her first-place performance with a time of 1:30.41 in the breast stroke. Junior Odessa Goudy worked her way into the rankings with a fourth place in the 200-meter individual medley (3:17.94) and a third spot in the 100-meter butterfly (1:35.66).

"We had a fast meet," Coach Sremba concluded. "This was our last race before district, and the kids really stepped up."

Points go through the rafters as Lowell edges Eddyville

If fans paid by the point, they got their money's worth at Tuesday's high-scoring clash between Eddyville and Lowell.

But in the end, the Eagle girls were short-changed by Lowell's game-changing strategy that delivered a 107-99 score.

"It was a tale of two halves," said Eddyville coach Shawn Ferschweiler, who watched a second-quarter lead evaporate under some basic mistakes. "The first half we played probably the best basketball we've played all season."

Led by Dezarae Eytchison, who scored seven of her nine points before halftime, Eddyville used its superior size and clockwork offense to earn a small lead in the second quarter.

"We were particularly good on offense," Ferschweiler observed. "We knew we had a size advantage, so we really wanted to pound it inside."

Olivia Schneidecker also posted six points in the first half, while Rachel Faxon netted five of her eight points in the first half, and Haley Preston scored her four points in the second quarter. But the aggressive key work came at a price as Breanna Jones, the team's leading rebounder, got into early foul trouble and was forced to the bench throughout the second quarter.

"That worried me that we wouldn't be able to get the ball up the court and run our offense, but it didn't seem to bother the girls at all," Ferschweiler said. "We still played real well and even had a small lead for a while in the second quarter."

Holding a 43-37 edge at the buzzer, Lowell emerged from the locker room with a new strategy for the second half that included a full-court man-to-man defense that left the Eagles scrambling. Time and again, Eddyville turned over the ball and was unable to get it into the posts.

"Instead of making good passes and cutting, we tried to make passes to someone who wasn't moving, or we tried to dribble in traffic," lamented Ferschweiler, whose domineering first-half posts combined for only five points in the second.

Still, Eddyville's stout defense carried them through the third quarter until Lowell's pressure finally prevailed in the fourth.

"They got some steals and some easy layups," Ferschweiler said. "It was disappointing because we played so well in the first half to come out in the second and play so poorly."

Facing a tough schedule with four big games in five days, Eddyville has no time to lick its wounds. Instead, Ferschweiler plans to have the lady roundballers focus on one game at a time with Mohawk in its crosshairs. The last time the teams met, the game ended early when Mohawk - shy on standouts - fouled-out all its players but one.

"We hope to pound the ball in to our posts and either score or get them to foul us," said the coach. "Hopefully we can play a complete game."

Outdoor Report

Steelhead: Winter steelhead fishing is slow to fair on the Alsea, Siletz and Yaquina rivers. Recent high flows have pushed fish into the upper basins but should produce fair opportunities on lower stems through the weekend as river levels continue to drop and clear. A variety of tactics can be productive, such as bait and bobber, drifting jigs or pulling plugs, but casting spoons and spinners is productive near riffles.

Deep-Sea Fishing: Intrepid fishermen landed small catches of rockfish and about one ling per angler last week. Watch for the weather windows - a calm ocean usually means better catches this time of year. Fishing in protected waters along jetties could also be productive now where lingcod are in shallower water to spawn.

Razor Clams: Razor clamming on the local beaches is good when surf and tide conditions permit, and 3- to 4-inch clams are common. Look for a minus tide and combined wave heights of less than 10 feet. Mussel harvesting is open along the entire Oregon coast and bay clam harvesting is open along the entire Oregon coast.

Victim Assistance Program

The Victim Assistance Program has helped victims of crime navigate the criminal justice system. Our program is always seeking community volunteers interested in helping victims of crime. Volunteer victim Advocates work alongside staff to provide emotional and informational support to victims of crime. The volunteer program in the District Attorney's Office reduces the impact and trauma on crime victims, while improving our community's involvement in and knowledge of the legal system. Our volunteers represent various segments of the county's population.

VOLUNTEER

Volunteers in the Victim Assistance Program can be students or community members who are interested in working with and advocating for victims of crime. We require a minimum one year commitment, but we do not stipulate a mandatory number of hours per week. Volunteering with the Victim Assistance Program provides great job experience in the criminal justice system and builds a great connection between you and your community.

All Volunteers gain great criminal justice experience with the following jobs in the Victim Assistance Program:

Court Accompaniment—Provide emotional and informational support during hearings, including trial and sentencing.

Grand Jury Advocacy—Provide emotional and informational support during the grand jury process.

Early-Contact Calls—Contact victims of crime to provide emotional and informational support, assist with safety planning and provide referrals to community resources.

Violation of Protection Order Assistance

Assist Victims of protection order violations by providing court accompaniment, hearing and sentencing information, and safety planning.



Restitution—Help victims determine and obtain monetary reimbursement to be paid by the defendant for losses incurred directly as a result of the crime.

Administrative Assistance—Assist Staff with file set-up, make informational phone calls to victims, and compose case status notification and disposition letters.

Requirements

- Complete a Volunteer Application
- Advocates must be over 18 years of age and willing to consent to a complete criminal history check. Advocates are asked to serve one year.
- Assistant Advocates must be 16—18 years of age with parental consent to a complete criminal history check.
- Consent to a UA drug test.
- Complete Training
- Resumes will not be accepted in lieu of applications.
- Incomplete application packets cannot be considered.

Summary: Volunteer applicants must pass a criminal history check, driving record check and drug test. We also contact three personal references. Applicants are invited to an interview to determine placement options and interests. Some positions have additional requirements.

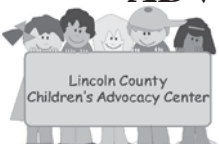

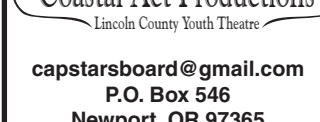
